BGC Early Learning Centre at full capacity as it begins operations

A new early learning centre providing 90 much-needed licensed childcare spaces for children between six weeks to six years in age is now operating at the Martensville Recreation Centre (MRC).

The non-profit organization known as BGC (Boys & Girls Clubs) Saskatoon originally announced last summer that it would be opening an early learning centre at the MRC in early 2026.

After extensive preparations, the new centre officially began operation this week.

"We're so excited to be out here in Martensville," said Jamie Melnyk, Director of Early Years Programs for BGC Saskatoon.

Melnyk said they have done very well in terms of sign-ups for their programs, and with the addition of a few late families joining in April, they will have effectively filled all 90 childcare spaces.

The majority of their sign-

ups are children from Martensville and area, though there are some kids from Warman and Dalmeny who are also enrolled.

Melnyk said the BGC Martensville Early Learning Centre takes up approximately 8,500 square feet at the MRC, with most of that space devoted to classrooms that are for specific age groupings.

It also boasts a kitchen that can be utilized for some of their programming, a sensory space for children who need a break and where a speech language pathologist will operate, a parent space/lobby where the centre's menus and documentation are posted, a staff room and an outdoor space that can be used as a classroom when the weather improves.

In total, there are approximately 19 early childhood educators and nutrition specialists working at the centre.

To be clear, the Early Learning Centre is a daycare that charges monthly fees to parents, but their curriculum is designed to help children reach developmental milestones, Mel-

nyk indicated.

BGC Saskatoon had not always planned on expanding to Martensville—they currently operate two other early learning centres in Saskatoon—but things changed when another organization's plans to set up a similar centre at the MRC fell through.

Melnyk said they like to seize an opportunity when it comes up, adding, "We want to help

meet the community need (for childcare spaces)."

It should be noted that funding for the centre is partially provided through the Canada-Saskatchewan Canada-Wide Early Learning and Child Care Agreement, which was signed in August 2021.

Incidentally, BGC has been providing childcare and related services within the Saskatoon area for over 50 years.

Access to nurse practitioners expanded

The Government of Saskatchewan's primary care Nurse Practitioner (NP) contract initiative is opening another round of intakes as a result of the overwhelming support received from both patients and providers in 2025.

NPs who want to deliver publicly funded primary care services are invited to apply.

Successful applicants will enter a contract with the Ministry of Health to provide primary health care to patients.

"Nurse Practitioners will play a vital role in ensuring every Saskatchewan family has access to a primary care provider by the end of 2028," Minister of Health Jeremy Cockrill said. "We look forward to seeing more Nurse Practitioners providing primary care in Saskatchewan communities as we work together to put patients first."

This initiative allows NPs to work to their full scope of training, promotes collective, team-based care, and creates more opportunities for Saskatchewan families to access publicly funded primary care delivered by NPs and is an alternative to private-pay NP services.

Through the first intake, the Government of Saskatchewan has signed contracts with 23 NPs as of February 2026 who will deliver primary care services to a minimum of 18,000 patients across the province.

"We are excited by the continued investment in Nurse Practitioners in Primary Care in our province and the expansion of the Primary Care Nurse Practitioner Contract Program," Saskatchewan Association of Nurse Practitioners (SANP) President Toni Giraudier said. "I look forward to seeing more Nurse Practi-

tioners providing consistent, high quality primary care to Saskatchewan residents."

The Ministry of Health will continue to work with the SANP to implement this initiative. There is no limit to the number of contracts the min-

istry may enter through the March 2026 intake, which will close on March 30. Information on future intakes will be shared in the coming months to ensure that upcoming NP graduates have opportunities to apply.

First Quarter Highlights

Call volumes are slightly ahead of the five year average, with 37 calls for service and 39 total incidents to the end of the first quarter.

Dalmeny Fire Rescue (DFR) hosted a wildland fire training course put on by the Saskatchewan Public Safety Agency (SPSA) on January 30 – 31. Ten DFR members attended, along with 13 members from other departments in the area.

DFR had four members take an Incident Command System (ICS) 200 course in Warman Feb 7 – 8, and eight members took an ICS 300 course in Warman March 20 – 22. These courses improve our ability to use the Incident Command System when we are a part of a large scale emergency incident.

Utility 20, the new F250 truck has had emergency equipment and decals installed. It is complete and in service.

Rescue 24, the replacement First Responder Vehicle, has been ordered from Crestline Coach Ltd., we expect delivery of this vehicle in late 2027.

The SCBA air bottle fill station and compressor have arrived and will be installed on Saturday, April 4, 2026 at the Fire Storage Area. This will greatly enhance our training and readiness for incidents which require members to be 'on air'!

We have had some changes to our officer ranks this quarter. Brian Hyland has accepted the role of Deputy Fire Chief, while Nikki Hyland has been promoted to Captain. Darlene Klassen and Devin King have been promoted to Lieutenant.

Weekly training is ongoing, with our regular rotation of Fire, Medical, Vehicle Extrication and Hazardous Materials topics. Training for our new members is ongoing, as well.

DFR membership is now at 30 members, with 4 members leaving us this quarter.

We continue to recruit members as Firefighters, Medical First Responders and Auxilliary Support Members.

Thanks to Town Council for your continued support of our efforts to keep our citizens safe!

Thanks to our members who spend countless hours training and responding to emergencies in our area!

On March 14, 2026, we had our 2nd Annual Family Day at the Rink. Starting at 1:00 p.m. we had a Family Public Skate followed by Public Shiny, ending the day with a Sabres Alumni game. We hired Kevin and Amy Sawyer's business Kasaw to put on the glow lights and light shows for the day. The day was well attended and enjoyed.

SASK LOTTERY COMMUNITY GRANTS

March 31 is the cut off for the previous year's Sask Lotteries Community Grant. We will be figuring out the allocations for the new grant year soon. If any community group is interested or needs more information, they can reach out to the office.

OUTDOOR RINK

Unfortunately, with the melting temperatures we had in February, the outdoor rink's ice had melted beyond repair. We decided to then close the outdoor rink for the season. There were a couple incidents of vandalism that had happened in the Warming Shack, including graffiti on the wall and urination in the wall heater. These acts of vandalism were both reported to the Dalmeny Police Service. We will need to investigate ways that we can avoid these situations in the future.

2026 RECREATION RATES

Chief Administrative Officer Jim Weninger and Office Manager Kelly Janzen reviewed the seasonal rates for the JJ Community Centre, Arena and the Centennial Park Ball Diamond this year and made appropriate changes. A Report regarding these seasonal rates will be forthcoming.

ARENA SCHEDULE

We are in the process of working with the Minor Sports groups for the 2026/27 arena schedule. Both Minor Hockey and Dalmeny Skating are seeing an increase in registrations, which is really great to see. We now need to reconfigure the ice times to accommodate the growing numbers.

SASK BALL HOCKEY

We are again on the schedule to host 25-35 ball hockey games along with a couple of tournaments at our arena. We will be needing to hire a Ball hockey employee to staff the events.

DALMENY MINOR BALL

This year Dalmeny has 7 teams made up of 4 Rally Cap, 2 Softball U11 and U13, and a U11 Baseball exhibition team, for a total of 78 kids! They will again coordinate the ball diamonds with the Sask5Giants. Start date is set for May 1st for outdoor practices to begin, weather permitting. They have arranged some indoor practices starting April 13, 2026 at the Arena.

BALL DIAMOND

The ball diamond that we had made improvements to in 2024 needs further improvements this year. Chief Administrative Officer Jim Weninger has had discussions with Virtue Construction and will be talking with other construction companies at the SUMA Convention. It is my understanding that Virtue Construction completed work on the other two ball diamonds some years ago.

CAO REPORT

April 6, 2026

1. 2026 Assessment Return:

The Town of Dalmeny advised the Saskatchewan Assessment Management Agency (SAMA) that one assessment may have been entered incorrectly. The Town amended the assessment and must allow a thirty (30) day appeal period for the property owner, if they wish to appeal their assessment. No other property owner may appeal their assessment during this period, as the assessment appeal period has ended for all other property owners.

2. Composting, Metal Recycling and Household Hazardous Waste Collection:

The Town of Dalmeny will again be holding its Annual Composting, Metal Recycling and Household Hazardous Waste Collection Event in May.

The Composting and Metal Recycling Event will take place from **Wednesday, May 6 to Saturday, May 9**. The Town of Dalmeny, in partnership with Loraas Disposal will be providing compost bins in the parking lot of the Town Office for compost materials.

Also, the Town of Dalmeny, in partnership with BN Steel & Metals will be providing a recycling bin for all of your metal and steel materials from **Wednesday, May 6 to Saturday, May 9** in the parking lot of the Town Office. In addition to this service, BN Steel & Metals will also be providing curbside collection on Saturday, May 9 from 8:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. A complete list of recycled steel and metal items will be posted on the Town's website in the coming weeks.

For the fourth year, the Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Collection will be held on **Thursday, May 7 from 11:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.** The Town of Dalmeny, in partnership with the Product Care Association of Canada and GFL Environmental, has established a location in the parking lot of the Town Office for acceptable HHW. A list of accepted and basic restrictions will be posted on the Town's website in the coming weeks.

3. Municipal Potash Tax Sharing Administrative Board:

The Municipal Potash Tax Sharing Administrative Board has advised the Town that our Potash Tax Sharing Revenue will increase from \$50,415.21 to \$56,815.20, an increase of \$6,399.99 or 12.7 percent.

4. 2025 Audited Financial Statement:

Jensen Stromberg Chartered Professional Accountants have completed the following:

- Consolidated Financial Statement
- Summarized Financial Statement
- Municipal Annual Expenditure Report (MAER)

The Town ended the year with a surplus of \$61,286.00. As in the past, the Consolidated Financial Statement and the Summarized Financial Statement will be posted to the Town's website when they are received.

5. SaskPower – Net Metering Excess Energy Rate:

On Monday, March 23, 2026, SaskPower advised the Town that the Net Metering Excess Energy Rate would be extended until March 31, 2029. The Town has consumed all excess energy provided by the solar panels, except for one (1) month. The current credit rate for excess energy exported to the grid is 7.5 cents per kilowatt-hour. Since the installation of the solar panels in 2022, the solar panels have provided \$9,829.20 in SaskPower savings to date.

6. Long Term Borrowing – Loan – Lift Station No. 2:

A Sewage Pumping Station (Lift Station #2) and force main, together with a Storm Water Pumping Station were constructed at a cost of \$1,890,960.00 circa 2010, of which the Town's portion was \$500,000.00. On March 29, 2026, after fifteen years, the Town paid the final payment of \$43,876.94.

The Lagoon and Sewage Pumping Station (Lift Station #1) will both be paid for in 2028. As the Chief Administrative Officer, I would like to congratulate past Councils and Managements for their foresight in completing these works. I believe the estimated cost of construction for a new lift station is \$3,000,000.00 to 4,000,000.00 and the estimated cost of construction of a lagoon would exceed \$10,000,000.00.

RESOLUTION PROCESS

Presentation of resolutions:

- The SUMA Board will determine the order in which resolutions are presented at the Convention.
- Resolutions will be presented on screen at Convention for voting, including the “Therefore” clause and the name of the sponsoring municipality.
- The Resolutions Session Host will read the action clause and ask for speakers supporting, opposing, or seeking amendment to the resolution.
- All speakers will be given no more than two (2) minutes to speak.
- If an amendment is proposed:
 - the amender will be given the opportunity to speak on behalf of the amendment.
 - If a speaker is opposed to the amendment, regular debate then occurs.
 - Once debate has concluded, or if there is no speaker opposed, the question is called.
 - If the amendment is successful, the amendment will be recorded, and the chair will ask for any speaker opposed to the amended resolution to speak.
- Should no members speak to the resolution, or at the close of debate, the Host will call the question.
- Resolutions which are not debated at a Resolutions Session because of insufficient time or lack of a quorum will be presented to the next meeting of the Board of Directors.

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2026-01: Regional Cost Sharing

The Village of Borden and the SUMA Board of Directors

Whereas urban municipalities provide the majority of essential community services and recreation facilities in Saskatchewan, including community halls, arenas, fire halls, parks, and libraries, that are used extensively by residents of surrounding rural municipalities; and

Whereas the capital and operational costs of constructing, maintaining, insuring, and staffing these essential facilities, including the hosting of regional library branches within urban community buildings, are borne disproportionately by small urban municipalities while rural municipalities contribute inconsistently relative to their resident usage; and

Whereas rural municipalities often contribute to fire protection services, but the hosting urban municipality remains responsible for maintaining the fire hall, carrying insurance costs (vehicle, liability, and facility), and providing administrative and logistical support to the fire departments; and

Whereas the long-term sustainability of regional services is critical to economic development, public safety, learning and literacy, and quality of life for all Saskatchewan residents;

Therefore be it resolved that SUMA advocate the Government of Saskatchewan for a strengthened provincial framework that ensures fair financial participation from rural municipalities in support of regional community services by implementing the following:

1. Mandatory cost-sharing agreements for essential regional emergency services such as fire response, ensuring fair proportional contribution relative to service area and population served;
2. Provincial incentive programs that encourage and support collaboration on recreational and community-based services and facilities, including library hosting costs, through capital and operational funding opportunities; and
3. Provincial guidelines and tools that assist municipalities in structuring fair contribution models and resolving disputes in a timely and equitable manner.

Background

Small urban municipalities frequently host and maintain regional facilities that serve residents well beyond their municipal boundaries. While rural municipalities benefit from these shared services, financial contributions are inconsistent and often inadequate to cover true costs. A clear provincial framework would promote fairness, predictability, and long-term sustainability for regional services that are vital to public safety, recreation, and community well-being.

Acts affected: The Municipalities Act, The Cities Act, The Planning and Development Act; Sectors/Regions affected: Cities, Towns, Villages, Resort Villages

2026-02: The Retention of Certified Water and Wastewater Operators

Village of Borden

Whereas safe drinking water and effective wastewater treatment are essential public services, and municipalities are required under *The Water Regulations, 2023* and *The Environmental Management and Protection Act, 2010* to ensure certified operators are responsible for the operation of waterworks and wastewater systems; and

Whereas urban municipalities — especially villages and small towns — invest substantial public resources into training operators to achieve and maintain certification, including tuition, travel, course materials, and paid training time; and

Whereas certified operators are in high demand and often leave for higher-paying positions in larger municipalities, utilities, or private industry shortly after certification, resulting in operational vulnerability, recruitment challenges, repeated training costs, and a service gap that increases risk to public health and regulatory compliance; and

Whereas small municipalities face limited tax bases and are increasingly unable to offer competitive compensation or career pathways that support long-term operator retention;

Therefore be it resolved that SUMA advocate the Government of Saskatchewan and the Government of Canada to develop and fund a retention-focused solution for small municipalities, including one or more of the following:

1. A Provincial Retention Grant Program that supports ongoing employment of certified operators in small communities for a defined term following training;
2. A Bonding/Return-of-Service Framework created at the provincial level to ensure cost-shared training investments result in retained municipal talent;
3. Funded Regional Operator Sharing Models, including cross-municipal agreements, mobile circuit riders, or dedicated regional public utility operators; and
4. Review of provincial wage supports or classification programs to ensure small municipalities remain viable service providers in compliance with regulated certification requirements.

Background

Municipal water and wastewater systems rely on highly trained, provincially certified operators. Small municipalities bear significant training costs yet struggle to retain these employees once certification is achieved due to limited fiscal capacity and wage

competitiveness. This results in recurring recruitment, training expenses, service disruptions, and heightened regulatory risk. A coordinated provincial or federal retention framework is necessary to stabilize rural and small-town utility operations, protect public health, and ensure compliance with environmental regulations.

Acts affected: None; Sectors/Regions affected: ALL

2026-03: Municipal Transparency Requirements

Village of Buchanan

Whereas the Government of Saskatchewan has introduced new transparency and communication requirements through modernization and red tape reduction initiatives, including obligations to maintain municipal websites and publish agendas, minutes, and financial information; and

Whereas small urban municipalities often operate with limited staffing and financial capacity, making it difficult to comply with these additional administrative responsibilities without reducing essential services or increasing costs to ratepayers; and

Whereas mandatory online posting of municipal documents creates privacy, security, and communication risks, including the potential for inadvertent disclosure of sensitive information protected under *The Local Authority Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act* (LA FOIP), and may expose municipalities to fraud attempts or targeted financial exploitation once financial information becomes publicly accessible; and

Whereas small municipalities frequently lack the technical tools, training, and legal expertise required to manage information security, perform proper document redaction, and respond to increased public expectations for explanations of council decisions;

Therefore be it resolved that SUMA advocate the Government of Saskatchewan to:

- Provide dedicated funding to small urban municipalities for website development, maintenance, and required online postings;
- Provide communication tools, templates, and training to help municipalities explain council decisions to the public;
- Ensure future transparency and reporting requirements include accompanying financial, technical, and training supports; and
- Provide resources to help municipalities manage privacy, redaction, information security, and financial theft risks associated with publishing municipal information online.

Background

Small urban municipalities in Saskatchewan are facing increasing administrative pressures as the provincial government advances its red tape reduction and modernization agenda. Bill 43 – The Municipalities Amendment Act, 2024 introduces new transparency and communication requirements that will require municipalities to maintain a public website, post council agendas and minutes, and publish financial and administrative information online.

For many small communities, these expectations come at a time when administrative capacity is already stretched. Most small urban municipalities operate with a single administrator who is responsible for all municipal functions, including governance support, financial management, public communication, and regulatory compliance. Adding new reporting and online publishing requirements will significantly increase workload and may force municipalities to divert time and resources away from essential services.

The requirement to publish financial information, contracts, and other municipal documents online also creates heightened privacy, security, and theft-related risks. Small municipalities often lack the tools and expertise needed to properly redact sensitive information, manage cybersecurity threats, or ensure compliance with LA FOIP. Errors in publishing financial data can expose municipalities to fraud attempts, targeted scams, and reputational harm.

Without dedicated funding and technical support, these new obligations place a disproportionate burden on small communities. Ensuring that municipalities have the resources to comply with legislative changes is essential to maintaining transparency, protecting privacy, and supporting the long-term sustainability of small urban governments.

Acts affected: The Municipalities Act; Sectors/Regions affected: Towns, Villages

2026-04 Enhanced Municipal Revenue Tools and Fiscal Fairness

City of Regina and SUMA Board of Directors

Whereas municipalities in Saskatchewan are limited in their ability to generate revenue, relying predominantly on property tax, which places a disproportionate burden on property owners and restricts fiscal flexibility; and

Whereas alternative revenue tools, including taxes and levies for infrastructure have been utilized in other jurisdictions to diversify municipal funding and reduce reliance on property taxation; and

Whereas the collection of provincial education property tax by municipalities imposes an administrative burden without corresponding compensation; and

Whereas removal of the payments in lieu for forgoing electrical generation have resulted in revenue losses; and

Whereas municipalities are required to pay Provincial Sales Tax (PST) on construction projects, further increasing costs and limiting the scope of infrastructure investment; and

Whereas municipal revenue sharing has provided valuable support to Saskatchewan municipalities, and any changes to municipal revenue tools should consider the importance and continued role of revenue sharing in supporting local government sustainability;

Therefore be it resolved that SUMA:

1. Advocate the Government of Saskatchewan to enable municipalities to access alternative revenue options including, but not limited to, new or improved taxation alternatives;
2. Advocate the Government of Saskatchewan to either collect its own education property tax directly or reinstate a grant to municipalities that compensates for the administrative burden of collection;
3. Advocate for the reinstatement of municipal payments in lieu for electrical revenues from SaskPower, restoring a vital source of municipal revenue; and
4. Advocate for the Province of Saskatchewan to exempt municipalities from Provincial Sales Tax (PST) on construction projects, thereby reducing costs and supporting infrastructure development.

Acts affected: Various; Sectors/Regions affected: ALL

2026-05 Improving Access to Emergency Care and Compensation for Fire Departments
City of Warman

Whereas *The Saskatchewan Ambulance Act* has remained largely unchanged for decades, despite significant advancements in healthcare delivery and substantial demographic shifts across the Province; and

Whereas current provisions, governing the licensing of ambulance operators and the designation of service districts and their EMS providers, may limit flexibility and hinder equitable access to emergency medical services across urban and rural municipalities and also where EMS services are not meeting performance expectations; and

Whereas modernizing these provisions would enable operational efficiency, encourage collaboration among service providers and align Saskatchewan's EMS framework with

best practices adopted in other jurisdictions, including performance-based contracts, that municipalities can provide input on; and

Whereas municipal fire departments across Saskatchewan are increasingly required to respond to medical emergencies, providing critical support and backstopping Emergency Medical Services (EMS); and

Whereas EMS services are funded through the Saskatchewan Health Authority (SHA), while fire departments receive no compensation for these medical responses despite incurring significant costs in personnel, training and equipment; and

Whereas no policy or funding is in place to allow municipal fire departments to transfer patients in emergency situations, if deemed the best option, when no ambulance is available; and

Whereas the costs associated with maintaining and upgrading fire department infrastructure, equipment and apparatus have risen dramatically in recent years, placing significant financial strain on municipalities; and

Whereas ensuring timely and equitable access to emergency medical services is essential for public safety, health outcomes and maintaining public confidence in the healthcare system;

Therefore be it resolved that SUMA advocate the Government of Saskatchewan to:

- review and amend *The Saskatchewan Ambulance Act*, specifically the provisions governing the licensing of ambulance operators and the designation of service districts, with the objective of ensuring timely and equitable access to emergency medical services across Saskatchewan; and
- establish a formal cost-sharing mechanism between the Government of Saskatchewan and municipalities to maintain and upgrade fire department infrastructure, equipment, and apparatuses; and
- compensate municipal fire departments for their role in responding to medical emergencies, recognizing their contribution to the province's integrated emergency response system.

Acts affected: The Saskatchewan Ambulance Act; Sectors/Regions affected: ALL

2026-06 Increased Funding for Local Housing Authorities

City of Estevan

Whereas access to safe, affordable housing is essential to the wellbeing and stability of residents in Saskatchewan communities; and

Whereas local Housing Authorities play a critical role in managing and maintaining affordable housing units for low- and moderate-income residents; and

Whereas rising costs for maintenance, utilities, insurance, and staffing have placed significant financial strain on Housing Authorities; and

Whereas current provincial funding levels are insufficient to maintain housing stock, address deferred maintenance, or meet increasing community demand;

Therefore be it resolved that SUMA advocate the Government of Saskatchewan to increase funding to local Housing Authorities to ensure the sustainability, maintenance, and expansion of affordable housing in all Saskatchewan communities.

Acts affected: None; Sectors/Regions affected: ALL

2026-07 Northern Bylaw Enforcement

Village of Air Ronge

Whereas consistent and equitable enforcement of municipal bylaws is essential to uphold community standards; and

Whereas limited staffing and administrative workload hinder the ability to provide equitable enforcement across all areas of northern jurisdiction;

Therefore be it resolved that SUMA advocate the Government of Saskatchewan to develop and implement a rotating schedule of bylaw enforcement officials throughout the northern jurisdiction to reduce administrative burdens and ensure consistent, fair, efficient, and visible enforcement of municipal regulations.

Acts affected: None.; Sectors/Regions affected: North

2026-08 Wildfire Mitigation

Town of La Ronge and Village of Air Ronge

Whereas the Village of Air Ronge and the Town of La Ronge are committed to protecting the health, safety, and welfare of its residents; and

Whereas wildfires pose a significant threat to life, property, and community stability; and

Whereas maintaining functional infrastructure and proactive risk mitigation measures is essential to reducing hazards and ensuring community resilience; and

Whereas the maintenance of existing fuel breaks and the expansion of fuel mitigation efforts are critical components of fire prevention and protection strategies; and

Whereas developing and maintaining bulldozed firebreaks ("CAT guards") are essential components for the strategic containment of wildfires and the protection of communities;

Therefore, be it resolved that SUMA advocate the Government of Saskatchewan and the Government of Canada to maintain existing fuel breaks and expand fuel mitigation efforts, including vegetation management and other approved measures, to reduce wildfire risk and enhance community safety in Saskatchewan; and

Be it further resolved that SUMA advocate the Government of Saskatchewan and the Government of Canada to maintain CAT guard perimeter for fire guarding and prevention purposes, ensuring it remains functional, accessible, and effective throughout the fire season and as conditions warrant.

Acts affected: None; Sectors/Regions affected: North

2026-09 Improving Census Procedures for Smaller Communities and Ensuring Accessibility for Seniors and Technologically-Challenged Individuals
Town of Tisdale

Whereas accurate census data is essential for municipal planning, service delivery, and securing equitable provincial and federal funding; and

Whereas smaller urban municipalities face unique challenges in census participation due to limited local administrative capacity and reduced in-person census outreach; and

Whereas most census enumerators assigned to small communities are not residents and may not be familiar with the local context, neighborhoods, or residents, which can reduce participation and accuracy; and

Whereas the increasing reliance on online census completion disproportionately impacts seniors and individuals with limited technological access or digital literacy; and

Whereas more accessible census options and improved support from Statistics Canada would help ensure complete and reliable population counts for small communities;

Therefore be it resolved that SUMA advocate Statistics Canada and the Government of Canada for improved census procedures that better reflect the realities and needs of smaller urban municipalities; and

Be it further resolved that SUMA request the reinstatement or expansion of in-person census options, paper-based forms, and outreach supports to ensure seniors and individuals with technological barriers can fully participate in the census; and

Be it further resolved that SUMA urge Statistics Canada to prioritize the hiring of local enumerators wherever possible and to provide enhanced training to ensure enumerators understand the community setting, thereby improving accuracy and participation rates.

Background:

The Town of Tisdale was one of the communities that experienced a population decrease in the 2021 Census. While population change can be influenced by many factors, the Town believes census methodology and accessibility challenges also play a role in undercounting residents in smaller communities. Tisdale, like many small urban municipalities in Saskatchewan, has an aging population. As census processes increasingly rely on online completion and digital communication, seniors and individuals with limited access to technology or digital literacy face barriers to participation. These challenges are compounded by reduced in-person census support and the use of non-local enumerators who may be unfamiliar with the community and its residents. Without more accessible and locally responsive census procedures, communities such as Tisdale risk continued underrepresentation, which directly affects long-term planning, service delivery, and eligibility for provincial and federal funding.

Acts affected: None; Sectors/Regions affected: ALL

2026-10 Reimbursement for Fire Department Services on Provincial Highways

Town of Balgonie

Whereas local fire departments provide essential emergency services by responding to incidents and accidents on provincial highways; and

Whereas Saskatchewan Government Insurance (SGI) is the first payer for fire department charges related to vehicle losses, including fire suppression and rescue/extraction services, based on SGI-established rates; and

Whereas local fire departments also respond to other emergencies such as chemical spills, hazardous materials spills, and debris clean-up; and

Whereas SGI does not reimburse local fire departments for services when the responsible driver and vehicle is unknown;

Therefore, be it resolved that SUMA advocate the Government of Saskatchewan to implement a fund to reimburse local fire departments for their time and equipment costs when managing scenes where submitting a claim to SGI is unsuccessful; and

Be it further resolved that SUMA seek an agreement with the Provincial Government and the Ministry of Highways stating that local fire departments and municipalities are not responsible for the costs associated with the clean-up of chemical spills or hazardous materials spills on provincial highways.

2026-11 Research Farm Closures

SUMA Board of Directors

Whereas the 2026 Federal Budget called for the downsizing and/or closure of long-standing research farms across the prairies, including locations near the Town of Indian Head and the Town of Scott; and

Whereas these research farms play an essential role in ensuring the long-term economic success of prairie agriculture and food security through the development and testing of seed and farming practices that are particularly beneficial to Saskatchewan parkland and grassland; and

Whereas this agricultural development plays a key role in the provincial economy as well as the local economies surrounding urban municipalities, where producers conduct their business and have their crops processed; and

Whereas the anticipated losses from the closure of these facilities are approximately 35 FTEs, 25 summer students and graduate trainees, and as much as \$400M in agricultural sector losses in the first year, in addition to tertiary losses in both urban and rural municipalities;

Therefore be it resolved that SUMA advocate the Government of Canada to pause and review any research farm closures or downsizing decisions pending a full, public impact assessment.

Legal Land Description of Property: Pcl A, NE 33-38-6-W3

Description of Proposed Use:

Application has been made to establish a Home-Based Business Type IV Application involving outdoor storage of vehicles, trailers and recreational vehicles at Pcl A, NE 33-38-6-W3.

The applicants have indicated that the storage area will be 4 acres within the parcel, with an internal road to be constructed from the storage area to Township Road 390. A maximum 50 parking spaces are permitted within the storage area, with a maximum of 50 business related visits to the site being permitted per day. As part of the business, no vehicle servicing, repairs, washing or cleaning will be permitted at the site.

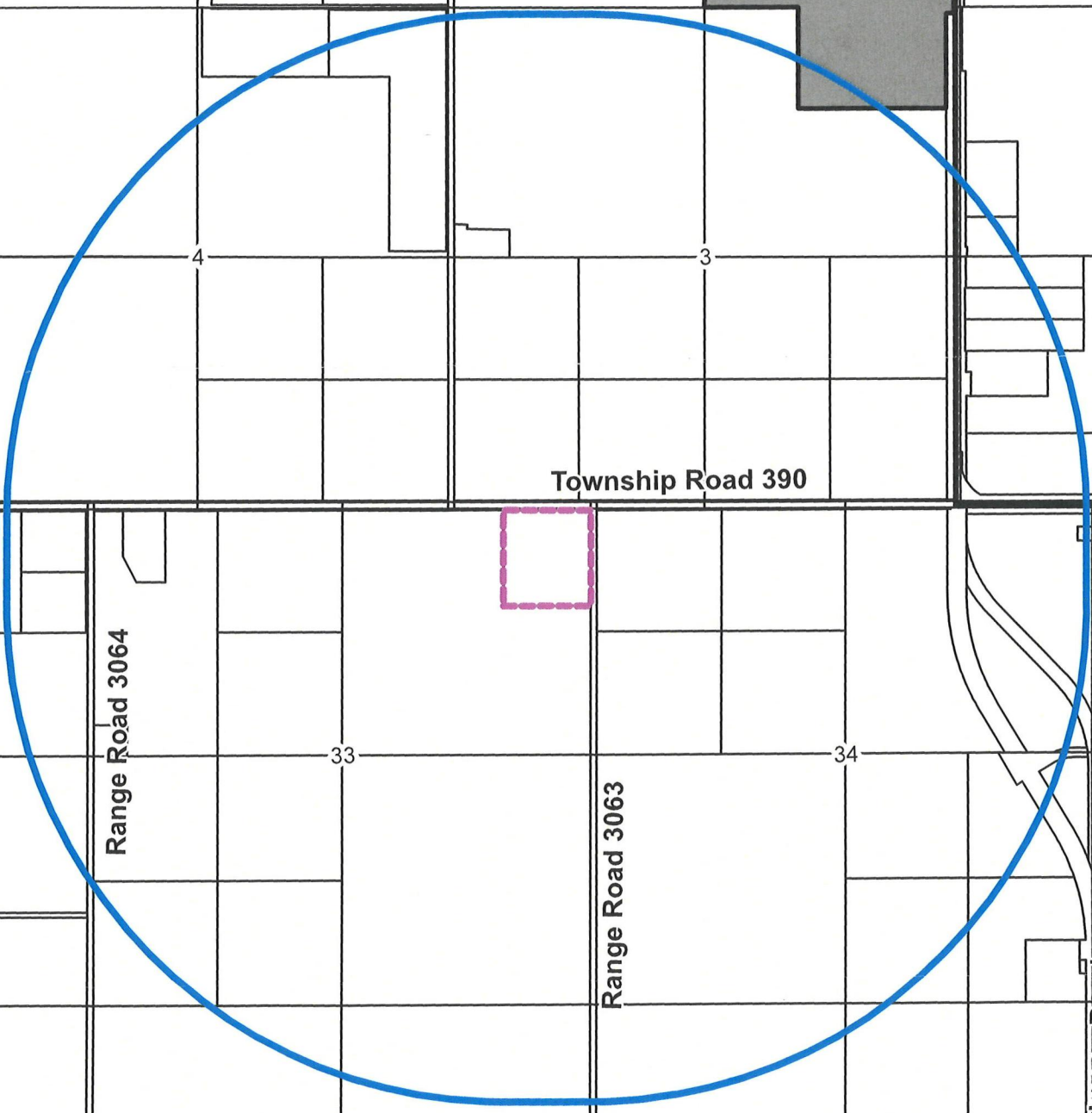
The applicants have advised that no external employees are to be employed, with the owners residing onsite. The operations will be year-round, with the intention to provide 24/7 access for customers. The storage area will be fenced, with lighting being placed around the area. The applicants have indicated they have planted approximately 5,000 trees to help screen the development from adjacent properties, and plan to plant an additional 1,200 shrubs to provide further screening.

The applicants propose to construct an on-site drainage pond to store run-off from the site. All drainage will be required to conform to an approved stamped engineered drainage plan.

The framework for Home Based Business Type IV uses was established through Bylaw 51-25, which was approved by R.M. of Corman Park Council in 2025, and included into the R.M. of Corman Park Zoning Bylaw, Bylaw 09-94. 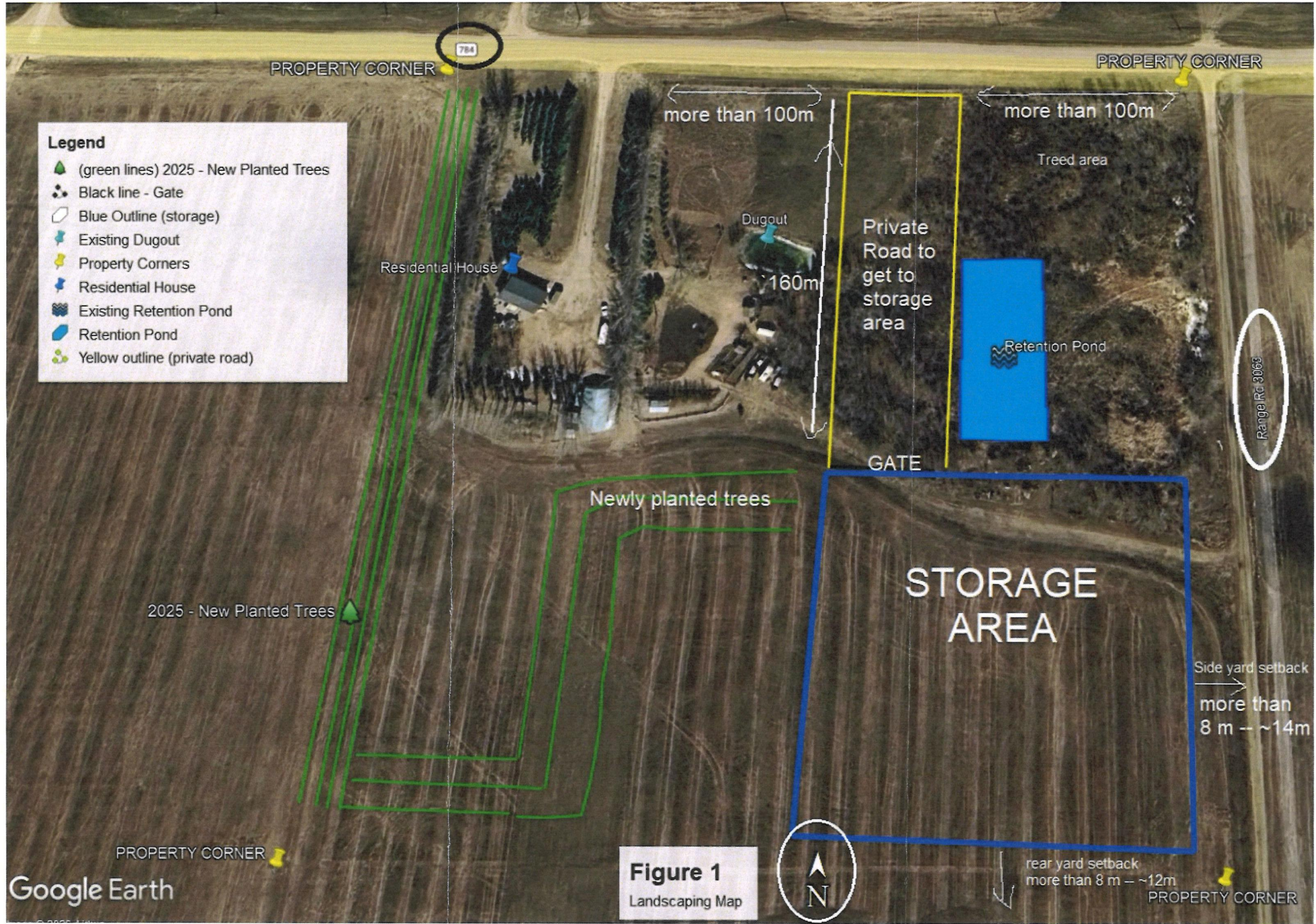


Discretionary Use Notification Map

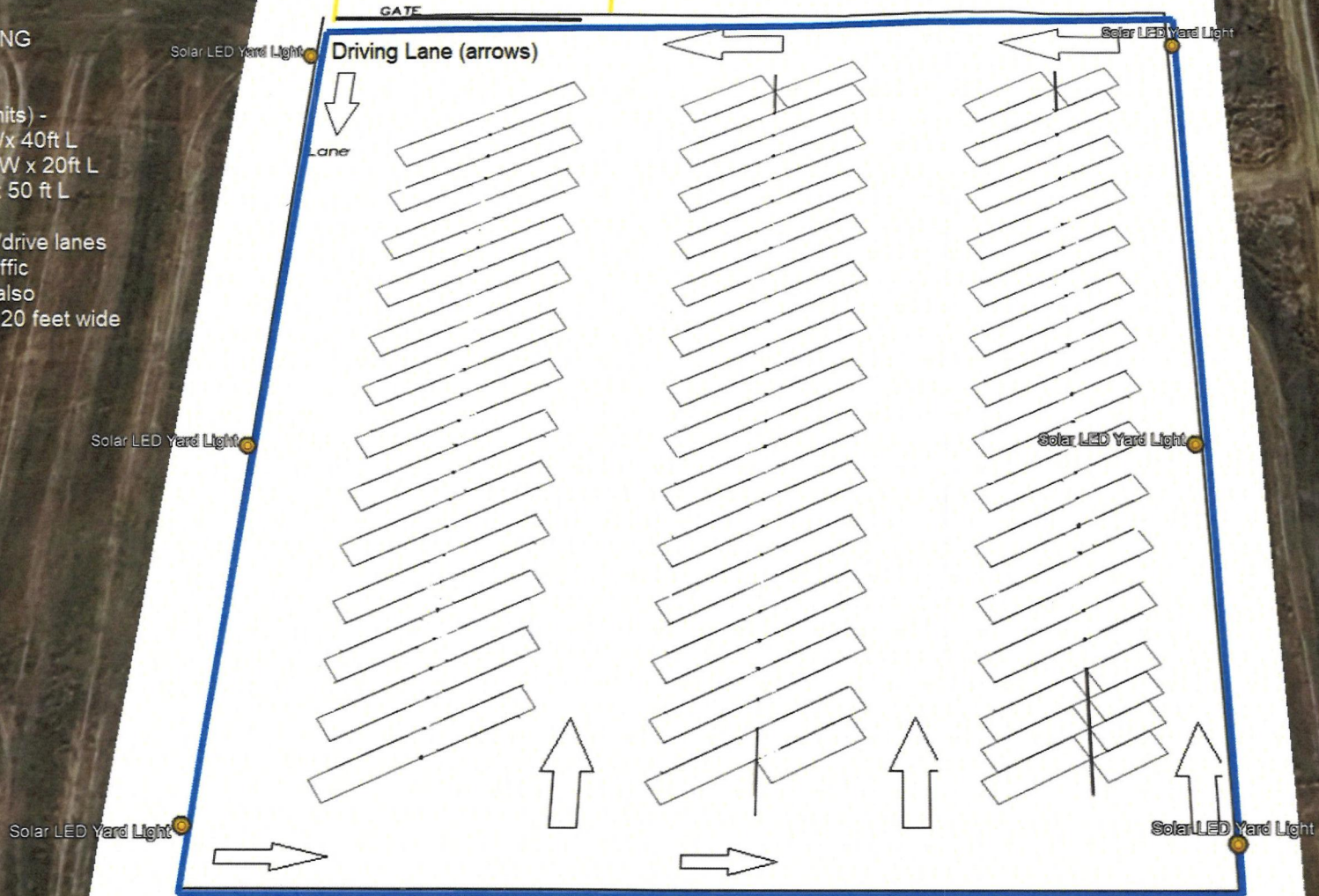
